

In addition to original, article-length (~6,000 word) empirical and theoretical research contributions, we also welcome book reviews, research notes, teaching articles, critical literature reviews, and reports on research creation that address the theme of the current call for papers.

Please review the following guidelines before submitting an article to STAR. Detailed instructions on book reviews are also available on the STAR website.

1. All submissions and correspondence should be in English (British spellings are acceptable). Please follow the formatting guidelines of the [American Sociological Association \(ASA\)](#) for references and in-text citations. Do not include documents other than those listed below.
2. All copies must be typed (12-point font) and double spaced on standard letter-sized pages (8½” by 11”); all margins should be exactly 1¼”. Footnotes and references do not require double spacing.
3. Each submission must include a cover letter, indicating the paper title, author's name, and institutional affiliation, as well as mailing and e-mail addresses for correspondence.
4. Each submission must also include a title page, indicating the paper title, author's name, a 200-word abstract, and keywords.
5. The text of the manuscript should begin on a separate page following the title page, with a running title-only header on each subsequent page. The author's identifying information should not appear on any page except for the title page of the submission.
6. Use headings and subheadings according to ASA guidelines in the text to indicate the organization of your paper.
7. References must appear at the end of the manuscript under the top-level heading **REFERENCES**.
8. Tables and figures may appear either in-line, where they should be appropriately titled, or at the end of the manuscript as an appendix (appendices should be demarcated under the top-level heading **APPENDIX \_\_\_**). If tables or figures are provided as an appendix, their applicability must be indicated at appropriate points in the text.
9. In-line citations should follow ASA guidelines.
10. Footnotes (no endnotes) should appear at the bottom of each page, numbered consecutively throughout the article with superscript Arabic numerals. Footnotes should be used sparingly and only to make substantive elaborations or clarifications that are directly relevant to your argument.
